Intensive Therapy-Dog Handlers Course

Learning objectives

This course is designed to teach handler and dog teams the skills required to visit institutions such as nursing homes, hospitals, schools & residential facilities. Upon successful completion of the course, participants will receive a certificate and Therapy-Dog Identification Coat.

The course will enable participants to;

- 1. Demonstrate effective, reward based dog handling skills in novel and highly distracting situations, including;
 - Communication, behaviour shaping, and problem solving (understanding how dogs learn and interact)
 - Obedience skills to reliable standards under distraction, including sit, drop, heel, recall and 'step away' (stay)
- 2. Identify and describe the strengths and weaknesses of the human-canine team, including stress and fatigue
- Describe how leadership, trust and consistency impacts on the human-canine team, and the dog's ability to work as a Therapy-Dog
- 4. Describe and implement Good Behaviour Shaping (GBS) strategies to ensure the ongoing leadership and trust between dog and handler
- 5. Demonstrate at least two therapeutic commands with the dog, and describe how they could be used
- 6. Describe at least three benefits of human-animal interaction with your chosen population group (e.g. Youth, elderly, disabled, etc)
- 7. Identify the key components required to implement Animal-Assisted Interventions (AAIs) in varying settings, including OH&S
- 8. Develop and demonstrate a simple AAI with the assistance of other course participants

Course outline

This course focuses equally on the theories underpinning AAIs, and the ability to practice and deliver interventions with your dog. Each day is divided into a combination of practice and theory. Lectures are designed to enhance participant's understanding of the skills gained each day, and the knowledge will build over the course of the week.

Intensive Therapy-Dog Handlers Course

Enrolment information

A maximum of 10 participants will be accepted into each course. Please enrol early to avoid disappointment. A 20% NON-REFUNDABLE deposit of \$270 is required to secure your place in the course. Fees must be paid in full 14 days prior to course commencement.

Humans

The course is designed to provide comprehensive training on how to incorporate a Therapy-Dog into a visiting or therapeutic/treatment program. The information will assist participants to develop confidence and skills to conduct visits and programs with their own dogs. It will suit any person working or studying in a human-services field already, including Teaching, Nursing, Psychology/Counselling/Social work, Aged Care, etc. The course is also appropriate for individuals who wish to conduct Therapy-Dog visits to nursing homes, hospitals, etc. Whilst there are no formal pre-requisites to attend the course, it is preferred that participants have a basic understanding of issues such as privacy legislation, professional conduct and occupational health and safety.

Dogs

Any people-friendly and happy dog can become a therapy dog given the appropriate training! There are no breed or old-age restrictions to do this course, however puppies must be at least 5 months of age to participate and there may be some additional requirements or follow-up required. This course will teach handlers to manage their dog's behavior, such as jumping, excitability, distractibility, etc in addition to teaching a very high level of communication and obedience. No previous training is necessary. Dogs should, however, be healthy, love people and have the temperament to cope with being a 'working' dog. All dogs require a current C5 vaccination.

Clothing and Equipment

Participants will be expected to bring their dogs to the centre each day of the course. During lectures, dogs will be learning to settle alongside their owners. When not with their owners, dogs will be provided with secure undercover pens or outdoor exercise yards. Please wear sensible clothing, including sturdy, closed-toe shoes and bring a coat, sunscreen and a hat. The centre is situated approximately 1 hours drive east of the city of Melbourne, in the hills of the Dandenong Ranges. Adequate undercover training areas and an indoor air-conditioned classroom are available.

Light refreshments will be supplied every day. Boiling water, fridge and microwave are also supplied for your convenience. To help keep costs to a minimum, please bring your lunch. You will be provided with comprehensive course and lecture notes and given ample time to ask questions relevant to your particular interests or profession. Please bring a pen and some additional paper to take notes if required. All teams passing the assessment on the final day will be supplied with a certificate and a Therapy-Dog Identification Coat. If teams are not ready to pass the assessment on the final day of the course, opportunities will be negotiated to re-sit the assessment at a later date.
